Baptisms celebrated most Sundays.

Dear Parish Family,

...Come follow me.....

We have begun our journey through the Gospel of Matthew. It is helpful to remember that this Gospel was probably written between 80–90 AD and presents Jesus as the fulfilment of Jewish prophecy—revealed most fully in his resurrection and in his mission to the world.

Scripture scholars say that Matthew's Gospel is shaped around five major sermons of Jesus. The first, which we will hear next weekend, is the well-known Sermon on the Mount (chapters 5–7), focusing on Christian living. The second sermon (chapter 10) gives instructions on how to live out the mission—to preach and to heal the world. The third (chapter 13) is a collection of parables explaining the Kingdom of God, where all are invited to belong. The fourth sermon (chapter 18) is about life within the community of faith—humility, forgiveness, and reconciliation. The fifth (chapters 24–25) speaks about the end of time and the call to remain always watchful and ready. I would even suggest a sixth sermon, the greatest teaching of all: Jesus' passion, death, and resurrection (chapter 27). Here, love lived out in total self-giving—loving neighbour and enemy, forgiving without limits, serving others, and trusting completely in God. This is the model for all.

As we prepare for next week's Sermon on the Mount, today's Gospel brings us to the beginning of Jesus' public ministry with a simple but powerful message: "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand." To repent does not simply mean to feel sorry for doing wrong. It means a willingness to change direction—to turn our lives toward God because something new has arrived. Matthew tells us that Jesus begins his ministry in Galilee, a place many would have considered ordinary, even insignificant. It had no major city of importance. And yet it is here that, as the prophet says, "the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light." God does not wait for perfect people or perfect situations. God enters ordinary lives—our lives—right where we are.

The second part of today's Gospel shows Jesus' walking along the Sea of Galilee, where he calls his first disciples: Simon, Andrew, James, and John. They are not scholars or religious leaders, but working-class fishermen—men likely living hand to mouth, burdened by Roman taxes and the struggle to make ends meet. Jesus simply says, "Come, follow me." What is always striking is their response. They leave their nets and follow him. No questions. No delay. Just trust.

Those nets represent security, income, routine, comfort and familiarity—the things that made sense in their lives.

So, what can we learn from today's readings?

Discipleship is not about knowing everything; it is about trusting Jesus enough to take the next step. His call invites us to change, to grow, and to become witnesses of his love. We all have our own "nets." Habits we're stuck in. Attachments we rely on too much. Fears that hold us back. As we reflect on these readings during the week ahead, let's pray for the courage to follow—to leave behind whatever keeps us from loving more fully, trusting more deeply, and living more freely. Because the kingdom of heaven isn't far away. It's very much close at hand.

We celebrate Australia Day this week, over the past weeks we have been reflecting upon the Bondi tragedy, what is highlighted is the Australian spirit to support each other in the good and the sad times. As we acknowledge our past, may we celebrate this land under the guidance of the Southern Cross.

**First Reading (Isaiah 8: 23 - 9:3)**

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

In days past the Lord humbled the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in days to come he will confer glory on the Way of the Sea on the far side of Jordan, province of the nations.

The people that walked in darkness  
has seen a great light;  
on those who live in a land of deep shadow  
a light has shone.

You have made their gladness greater,  
you have made their joy increase,  
they rejoice in your presence  
as men rejoice at harvest time,  
as men are happy when they are dividing the  
spoils.

For the yoke that was weighing on him,  
the bar across his shoulders,  
the rod of his oppressor,  
these you break as on the day of Midian.

**Second Reading**

**(1 Corinthians 1: 10-13, 17)**

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Corinthians

I appeal to you, brothers, for the sake of our Lord Jesus Christ, to make up the differences between you, and instead of disagreeing among yourselves, to be united again in your belief and practice. From what Chloe's people have been telling me, my dear brothers, it is clear that there are serious differences among you. What I mean are all these slogans that you have, like: 'I am for Paul', 'I am for Apollos', 'I am for Cephas', 'I am for Christ'. Has Christ been parcelled out? Was it Paul that was crucified for you? Were you baptised in the name of Paul?

For Christ did not send me to baptise, but to preach the Good News, and not to preach that in the terms of philosophy in which the crucifixion of Christ cannot be expressed.

Jesus preached the Good News of the kingdom  
and healed all who were sick.

**Gospel (Matthew 4: 12-23)**

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Hearing that John had been arrested Jesus went back to Galilee, and leaving Nazareth he went and settled in Capernaum, a lakeside town on the borders of Zebulun and Naphtali. In this way the prophecy of Isaiah was to be fulfilled:

Land of Zebulun! Land of Naphtali!  
Way of the sea on the far side of Jordan,  
Galilee of the nations!  
The people that lived in darkness  
has seen a great light; on those who dwell in the  
land and shadow of death  
a light has dawned.

From that moment Jesus began his preaching with the message, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.' As he was walking by the Sea of Galilee he saw two brothers, Simon, who was called Peter, and his brother Andrew; they were making a cast in the lake with their net, for they were fishermen. And he said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you fishers of men.' And they left their nets at once and followed him. Going on from there he saw another pair of brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John; they were in their boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. At once, leaving the boat and their father, they followed him.

He went round the whole of Galilee teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the Good News of the kingdom and curing all kinds of diseases and sickness among the people.

## LATEST NEWS FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS 25 JANUARY 2026

The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish.

Here are key ways to **safeguard children returning to or commencing school** — focusing on *physical safety, travel, and online protection*:

1. **Safe travel to and from school** - Plan and practise the route with your child. Always use pedestrian crossings, hold hands with younger children, and model safe road behaviour. *Meet children on the school side of the road* and **don't** call them across traffic. Check pick-up/drop-off routines with teachers to avoid confusion.
2. **Communication and awareness** - Talk with your child about *road safety, staying with friends*, and telling you if they feel unsafe. Make sure they know who will meet them after school and where.
3. **Online and social media safety** - Parents should be cautious about *posting back-to-school photos*. Avoid sharing identifiable information like full names, school logos, locations or ages, and tighten privacy settings to *trusted contacts only*.
4. **Engage with school safety policies** - Stay in touch with teachers and administrators about safety plans, emergency drills, and behaviour policies. Open communication helps address issues like bullying or harassment early.

A calm, informed approach helps children feel secure and supports a safer start to the school year.
