Baptisms celebrated most Sundays.

Dear Parish Family,

...This is my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on him.

At the very heart of our being is the need to belong, whether it be family, friends, school, sports or even church. During my convalescence, I managed to catch up on some reading. I've always been an admirer of the work of Professor Brene Brown. She is an author, speaker and researcher who studies life in society today. Her book: *Braving the Wilderness: The Quest for True Belonging and the Courage to Stand Alone* speaks about the difference between belonging and its opposite she sees, fitting in. She writes that *true belonging doesn't require you to change who you are; it requires you to be who you are*. The opposite to this is "fitting in" which means *shaping ourselves to resemble what we think other people want, which isn't true to who we are*. Belonging then requires us to be courageous against the realities of the world today that often tries pulling us one way or another – you should be this or you should be that; and then significantly trying to draw us away from caring for each other. I think it's something to think about when we ask ourselves- what does it mean to be baptised in the world today?

This Sunday we celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of Jesus. Have you ever wondered if Jesus wasn't born with original sin, then why did he need to be baptised? How did the gospel writers address this question...well John leaves it out; Mark and Luke just simply state that he was baptised, but Matthew has John the Baptist ask the same question; with Jesus replying to "*fulfil all righteousness*". In other words, identifying himself with you and me. I've always struggled with the question about Jesus' Baptism until my retreat last year with Bishop Greg Homing of the Lismore Diocese. His answer is that it goes back to the question of belonging. Jesus' Baptism was about Jesus' making sense of his life. How so? There is no doubt that Mary and Joseph would have spoken to Jesus about his birth and there is no doubt there would have still been some talk around Mary's pregnancy. He lived in a small village! He would have known about all the prophecies about him; he also knew the scriptures well. What would have been going on in his mind?

Something changes at the baptism. All those thoughts of who he was, where he was from, the prophecies about his life would now make sense when the skies open and God speaks "*This is my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on him.*" Confirmation that he is the Son of God, God made man. He is the beloved, ie. he is loved! God's favour rests on him, he knows now he has a mission, a task ahead of him. He belongs! Jesus' baptism helps us to make sense about our own baptism – we are God's sons and daughters; we are loved; and we too have a mission of being good news to all who we meet. Through Baptism we are part of the Christian community, the Church. Belonging to the Church means that we are called to be who we are and not merely fitting into the crowd. We are here to make a difference and to make the world a better place. May we always celebrate the gift of baptism in each and every one of us.

I hope everyone had a great Christmas and start to the New Year of 2026. Again, many thanks to all those whose ministries supported our wonderful celebrations of Christmas and New Years...thank you!! This weekend, you will have noticed some changes: we are now known collectively as the Lakeside Pastoral Region (this doesn't change the canonical status of any of the parishes - that remains the same). Also, the bulletin is now condensed to try and reduce admin time which will assist the admin team to better support the parishes and myself. Finally, in the next week, I will be announcing some changes within the parish offices. Stay tuned.

water, and suddenly the heavens opened and he
saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and
coming down on him. A voice spoke from heaven,
'This is my Son, the Beloved; my favour rests on

LATEST NEWS FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS 11 January 2026



The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish. This week our focus is on Working With Children Check (WWCC)

In New South Wales (NSW), a Working With Children Check (WWCC) is not generally required for working with vulnerable adults, unless the role also involves working with children. The WWCC is specifically designed to protect children under 18 and is mandatory only for jobs or volunteering that involve child-related work such as teachers (school, pre-school, music, dance), sports coaches, tutors, nannies, faith leaders and children's entertainers.

For roles that involve working with vulnerable adults, different background checks may apply, depending on the sector. For example, workers in the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) are required to have an NDIS Worker Check, which assesses whether a person poses a risk to people with disability. Similarly, those working in aged care may need to complete an Aged Care Worker Screening Check, which focuses on protecting older people from abuse, neglect, or exploitation.

In New South Wales (NSW), a National Police Check is often required for people working with vulnerable adults, but whether it is legally mandatory depends on the role, industry, and employer.

Even when not legally required, employers may request a police check as part of their duty of care and risk management, especially when workers have close, unsupervised, or ongoing contact with vulnerable adults.
