Dear Parish Family,

...may your kingdom come...

The feast of Christ the King marks the end of the liturgical year and the year long journey through the Gospel of Luke. Did you know that the Feast of Christ the King wasn't instituted into the Church until 1925 by Pope Pius XI. Why then? From history at school we learnt that there used to be many large empires and monarchies. Over time there were the rise and falls of royal households such as Germany and Russia which led to the First World War. After the war, with rising secularism and atheism happening, Pope Pius' intention was to counteract these by declaring the majesty and the power of Jesus Christ, King and ruler of the World.

Now when we think of Kings/Queens all sorts of images come to mind. For most of us it's the English royal family to which we belong to in this Commonwealth. The same family that hasn't always had the best history or been the best examples. During my recent visit to London, I got to visit Buckingham Palace ... wow it is very grand! Did you know it has 775 bedrooms? It was very hard to not comment that it would make a great hostel, especially given the King and Queen are not living in it and there were so many people living on the streets with London's housing crisis. If it was only that easy. Ok! There's some Scottish rebellion in me. But is this the image of kingship that our readings portray.

In our first reading, David had come a long way from tending sheep and playing on the harp. Having killed the giant Goliath and proved himself in battle, it became difficult for the current King Saul to not be nervous at his success and popularity. When Saul dies, David is declared King of the south but as we hear in the readings today, with an agreement with those in the north, David is finally declared the King of all of Israel. He united the kingdoms. From here with the promise of the messiah coming from the House of David, they would believe he will be like this kingship powerful and strong.

When Luke tells the story of Jesus, he presents Jesus with a particular kind of people and their history. He is born into a tradition; he is born into the House of David. His kingdom is different; it is the one that looks out for people who are ignored in every other kingdom – the poor and the broken and the wounded. It is fitting that in our Gospel, Jesus ends up between two criminals, between the kind of people he reached out to in his ministry to tell the good news that they were welcome into the kingdom. Even in his agony, he still had time for others. The liturgical year comes to completion in the last words of the Gospel. "Today you will be with me in paradise". Words that we long to hear of a king we celebrate and whose values we are called to live. May your kingdom come.

This week is the end of the month of November. The month of remembrance. Next Saturday at 5.30pm, as part of the centenary celebrations, there will be a special Mass at Our Lady Help of Christians, Boolaroo. It will be a time to pause and remember, all who have been part of the parish and especially those who were buried from Our Lady Help of Christians Church. All are welcome to join.

One of the criminals hanging there abused him. 'Are you not the Christ?' he said. 'Save yourself and us as well.' But the other spoke up and rebuked him. 'Have you no fear of God at all?' he said. 'You got the same sentence as he did, but in our case we deserved it: we are paying for what we did. But this man has done nothing wrong. Jesus,' he said, 'remember me when you come into your kingdom.' 'Indeed, I promise you,' he replied, 'today you will be with me in paradise.'



LATEST NEWS FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING PROMOTERS 23 November 2025

The Promoters of Safeguarding continue to endorse a culture of safeguarding within the Parish.

As we are about to enter Advent, it is timely to provide you with the activities of the Safeguarding promoters in 2025. We are pleased to inform you that we are now the Lakeside Safeguarding promoters, which represents Warners Bay, Boolaroo, Booragul, Morisset and we are looking for a member from Toronto. We meet in person twice a year and are active in the Diocesan Safeguarding Network.

All Lakeside Promoters are required to sign a confidentiality agreement, which means any matter that comes to our attention stays private except when required by law to report e.g. a child at risk. This commitment protects vulnerable adults in our community. If there is a report of a vulnerable adult, we gain consent to document the issue, further protecting the individual.

We have developed a process for the management of reports concerning a vulnerable adult. This process ensures that all matters are managed in an orderly manner. We have been lobbying for an automatic defibrillator for the Warners Bay, Boolaroo and Booragul churches and a portable device (similar to that at Morisset) will be purchased in the new year.

In the new year we will be producing podcasts/ short clips on the need for, and common legal issues related to wills, power of attorney, guardianship that **all** adults need to consider. This concept has arisen from issues that came to our attention this year. We will ask your assistance by writing your questions on sheets that will be in the foyers of each church in the **new year**. An announcement after Mass will be made when the sheets are available. The final product will be available on our parish website.

May God fill your life with love, joy, and peace this Christmas and throughout the New Year.
