Dear Parish Family,

Prepare a way for the Lord.....

In the second week of Advent, we light candle number two — the Peace Candle sometimes also called the Prophet Candle! The prophets throughout the ages spoke of the coming of the messiah, of one born a king in the line of David. Isaiah in the first reading foretold a time of peace was coming. What did this mean for the people of Isaiah's time who were living more than 600 years before the birth of Jesus. All they had known was war. They had been taken from their country in captivity. They had felt God had been silent, but Isaiah speaks of someone from the *stock of Jesse*. Who was Jesse? Jesse was the father of King David. There was a sense with the coming of the messiah, a return to the natural or let's say peaceful order of things...the wolf lives with the lamb...

One of the most haunting songs in the musical, Jesus Christ Superstar is John the Baptist singing ...Prepare ye the way of the Lord...(you're probably singing it in your head right now!) It's haunting because it's the call to a change of heart, he knew who was about to come next. The central figure of Advent is John the Baptist. His address is c/o the wilderness... why there? That is the traditional place associated with growth of Israel's religions. It was in the desert that the people of Israel first met God and it's in the desert they could hear God closely. So, it's appropriate that the last great prophet who links both the Old and the New Testament comes from the wilderness. John begins his ministry by baptising, and his message is

clear ...prepare a way for the Lord, make his path straight. What is it that we may need to make straight be it at work, at school, at home or with my family?

As we draw closer to Christmas, we are called to a change of heart. We are all aware of areas in our life that might need to be challenged, that might need to be changed. Advent is the time of change; may we be found at Christmas time to not be like the Inn that had no room left.

As we light the second candle this weekend of our Advent wreaths...we light the candle of peace! Peace is like a light shining in a dark place. As we look at the light of the candle, we celebrate the peace we find in Jesus Christ.

# First Reading

Isaiah 11:1-10

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

He judges the poor with justice.

A shoot springs from the stock of Jesse, a scion thrusts from his roots: on him the spirit of the Lord rests, a spirit of wisdom and insight, a spirit of counsel and power, a spirit of knowledge and of the fear of the Lord. (The fear of the Lord is his breath.) He does not judge by appearances, he gives no verdict on hearsay, but judges the wretched with integrity, and with equity gives a verdict for the poor of the land. His word is a rod that strikes the ruthless, his sentences bring death to the wicked.

Integrity is the loincloth round his waist, faithfulness the belt about his hips.

The wolf lives with the lamb, the panther lies down with the kid, calf and lion cub feed together with a little boy to lead them.

The cow and the bear make friends, their young lie down together.

The lion eats straw like the ox.

The infant plays over the cobra's hole; into the viper's lair the young child puts his hand.

They do no hurt, no harm, on all my holy mountain, for the country is filled with the knowledge of the Lord as the waters swell the sea.

That day, the root of Jesse shall stand as a signal to the peoples. It will be sought out by the nations and its home will be glorious.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

Christ, the hope of all people.

Everything that was written long ago in the scriptures was meant to teach us something about hope from the examples scripture gives of how people who did not give up were helped by God. And may he who helps us when we refuse to give up, help you all to be tolerant with each other, following the example of Christ Jesus, so that united in mind and voice you may give glory to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ.

It can only be to God's glory, then, for you to treat each other in the same friendly way as Christ treated you. The reason Christ became the servant of circumcised Jews was not only so that God could faithfully carry out the promises made to the patriarchs, it was also to get the pagans to give glory to God for his mercy, as scripture says in one place: For this I shall praise you among the pagans and sing your name.

## Gospel

Matthew 3:1-12

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.

In due course John the Baptist appeared; he preached in the wilderness of Judaea and this was his message: 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.' This was the man the prophet Isaiah spoke of when he said:

A voice cries in the wilderness: Prepare a way for the Lord, make his paths straight.

This man John wore a garment made of camel-hair with a leather belt round his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. Then Jerusalem and all Judaea and the whole Jordan district made their way to him, and as they were baptised by him in the river Jordan they confessed their sins. But when he saw a number of Pharisees and Sadducees coming for baptism he said to them, 'Brood of vipers, who warned you to fly from the retribution that is coming? But if you are repentant, produce the appropriate fruit, and do not presume to tell yourselves, "We have Abraham for our father," because, I tell you, God can raise children for Abraham from these stones. Even now the axe is laid to the roots of the trees, so that any tree which fails to produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown on the fire. I baptise you in water for repentance, but the one who follows me is more powerful than I am, and I am not fit to carry his sandals; he will baptise you with the Holy Spirit and fire. His winnowing-fan is in his hand; he will clear his threshing-floor and gather his wheat into the barn; but the chaff he will burn in a fire that will never go out.'



### LATEST NEWS FROM OUR SAFEGUARDING **PROMOTERS 7 November 2025**

Safeguarding children during Christmas crucial due to increased risks of abuse, neglect, and emotional distress, necessitating vigilance and support from adults. Increased risks include:

- 1. **Domestic Abuse:** The festive period often sees a rise in domestic violence, with children trapped in unsafe environments. Schools, which typically provide a support network, are closed, leaving vulnerable children without access to trusted adults.
- 2. Financial Strain: The pressure to provide a "perfect" Christmas can lead to financial difficulties, exacerbating family tensions and increasing the risk of neglect or abuse. Families may struggle with the costs of gifts and celebrations, leading to stress and conflict.
- Isolation and Loneliness: With schools closed, children may lose contact with their support networks, leading to feelings of isolation. This can be particularly harmful for those already experiencing neglect or abuse, as they may feel trapped and unable to seek help.
- 4. **Increased Supervision Needs:** Children may be left unsupervised for extended periods, especially if adults are preoccupied with holiday preparations or socialising. This lack of supervision can expose them to various risks, including accidents and online dangers.
- 5. Proactive safeguarding of children can help ensure that the holiday season is a time of joy and safety rather than distress and danger.
