Everlasting joy on their faces...

In this third week of Advent, we light candle number three – the pink candle representing joy! Halfway through Advent we pause for a moment to celebrate Gaudette Sunday, a Sunday of joy. As I mentioned last weekend, the people of Isaiah's time had only known war, having been taken over by the Assyrians and by Jesus' time, it was another enemy, the Romans. Between being in captivity and heavy taxes on the people it was Isaiah's vision of what life might look like when the Messiah finally comes. Isaiah paints this as a picture of regeneration where the desert that once seemed to be dead is now bursting with life; eyes that lacked sight can now see; ears incapable of hearing can now hear; limbs without strength shall leap; and tongues not able to speak will speak - all are given new life.

Let's set the scene of the Gospel – it opens in the darkness of a dungeon. John openly denounced Herod for divorcing his wife and marrying his brother's wife (forbidden in Jewish Law). Herod was always nervous because there was always political unrest and his appointment was by the Romans. Therefore, no one respected him. Do you think John was a bit confused? John's idea of the Messiah if you remember from last week's Gospel, was the strict judge, who will bring fiery judgement ...maybe even break him out of prison! So, he sends out his disciples to ask Jesus, "are you the one who is to come?". All he has heard about this Jesus is that he heals the sick; blesses the gentle and the peacemakers and calls everyone not to judge one another and even to love your enemies! Isn't that the fulfilment of Isaiah's vision, all the things that are to happen when the Messiah comes are happening with me – that's your answer!

As we enter this third week we build on the Advent themes of anticipation, being prepared, people of hope, peace and now we add joy to the list. What areas of my life need some joy - be it in myself, my family, my work, school or community? How can I bring joy to others? As things ramp up closer to Christmas, it's always a reminder to not lose sight of the why we are celebrating.

As we light the third candle this weekend of our Advent wreaths...we light the candle of joy! Through our baptism, Jesus is born in us, we have joy and that through him there will be everlasting joy on earth. Joy is like a light shining in a dark place. As we look at the light of this candle, we celebrate the joy we find in each other and in Jesus Christ.

This week, our schools will begin finishing up for this year of 2025. What a great year to journey together! We wish our young people a safe and rest filled break. To our school teams led by Mark (St John Vianney, Morisset), Nikki (St Josephs, Kilaben Bay), Nick (St Paul's, Booragul) and Liz (St Mary's Warners Bay) thank you for your commitment to our young people through Catholic education and in supporting our parishes' vision of mission together. Wishing you also a safe and rest filled break and look forward to furthering our mission together in 2026 with blessings of this coming season of Christmas.

I will be back from this weekend on a limited return to work schedule. I'm feeling fine but my body is taking its time....and again thanks for all the prayers and good wishes.

# First Reading

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

God himself will come and save us.

Matthew 11:2-11

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Are you the one who is to come, or must we wait for someone else?

John in his prison had heard what Christ was doing and he sent his disciples to ask him, 'Are you the one who is to come, or have we got to wait for someone else?' Jesus answered, 'Go back and tell John what you hear and see; the blind see again, and the lame walk, lepers are cleansed, and the deaf hear, and the dead are raised to life and the Good News is proclaimed to the poor; and happy is the man who does not lose faith in me.'

As the messengers were leaving, Jesus began to talk to the people about John: 'What did you go out into the wilderness to see? A reed swaying in the breeze? No? Then what did you go out to see? A man wearing fine clothes? Oh no, those who wear fine clothes are to be found in palaces. Then what did you go out for? To see a prophet? Yes, I tell you, and much more than a prophet: he is the one of whom scripture says: Look, I am going to send my messenger before you; he will prepare your way before you. I tell you solemnly, of all the children born of women, a greater than John the Baptist has never been seen; yet the least in the kingdom of heaven is greater than he is.'



# Stay safe and 'elfy over the summer holidays



You might be a decorating machine or just wanting to pop a few lights on the tree. Either way, make sure you're following basic safety steps. To decorate safely, ensure you're following manufacturer's instructions and have power points turned off before plugging in lights.



December and January are traditionally the months the highest number of recorded road accidents. Avoid rushing when travelling to Christmas lunch and other social occasions. Plan your route ahead of time and allow plenty of time to get there.



Never travel into any high-risk bushfire area where a Catastrophic day has been declared. If you're staying in a high-risk bushfire area, the safest option is to leave the night before or early in the day on which Catastrophic has been declared. Before you travel, make sure you download the relevant emergency app for your state and check the fire danger rating for your destination. While you're away, listen to local radio for warnings and advice when you're on the road. Always follow the advice of emergency services.



We all know how the Australian sun can be incredibly intense. Protect yourself by wearing a hat, sunglasses, and sunscreen with a high SPF. Stay in the shade as much as possible, especially during the hottest part of the day where UV rays are highest (between 11am and 3pm).



Chuck a few prawns on the barbie this summer, but don't forget the golden rules: find a flat spot and steer clear of anything flammable; have a bucket of water or fire extinguisher ready to spring into action; avoid wearing loose clothing; and keep children and pets away from the BBQ area.

'Know the Drill, before you Grill'. Be sure to check your gas connection before you BBQ - get into the habit of doing a soapy water check. Squirt your gas connection with soapy water to make sure there are no leaks. If no bubbles appear, you're safe to use.



During the hot weather over summer, it's important to stay hydrated and drink plenty of water. Sugary drinks and alcohol can cause dehydration, so it's best to avoid them.

Check on elderly friends and family to ensure they are staying cool and hydrated.

Over Christmas, some services may be closed or limited. Being prepared will avoid unnecessary issues.

- Check if you have enough scripts and medications to get you through the public holidays?
- If you are going away, do you have an up to date list of your medications?
- Christmas can be stressful or lonely. The Mental Health Line 1800 011 511 or Lifeline 13 11 14 can offer support.
- If you have a health concern but your GP is closed, you can call Health Direct for trustworthy health advice on 1800 022 222.
- Avoid hurting yourself or others, drink safely this Christmas. Maybe try to schedule alcohol-free days each week.
